A Youth-led Research to Contribute
Policy Perspectives from Young Africans
during the Summit of the Future
September 2024

The <u>Summit of the Future</u> provides a once-in-a-generation opportunity to reinvigorate multilateral collaboration and develop strategies tailored to current realities for addressing the pressing challenges of our time. Effective global cooperation is increasingly critical to our survival but difficult to achieve in an atmosphere of mistrust, using outdated structures that no longer reflect today's political and economic realities.¹ Africa is central to this transformation, claiming its rightful place at the global leadership table while working to achieve the 2023 Agenda and the African Union's Agenda 2063.

The alignment between the Summit of the Future and Agenda 2063 is profound and strategic. This agenda, guiding Africa's path to prosperity through initiatives prioritizing infrastructure development, human capital investment, and regional integration, envisions a future where the continent plays a pivotal role in global governance and economic stability. The Summit allows Africa to assert its priorities, influence global strategies, and foster partnerships that respect its autonomy. Africa's participation is crucial for shaping an agenda that supports Agenda 2063's aspirations, positioning the continent at the forefront of inclusive global governance and sustainable development.

To unlock the Summit's full potential to impact Africa's development, we must recognize internal and external dynamics shaping the continent's trajectory. Internally, Africa grapples with diverse socioeconomic challenges, necessitating nuanced policy frameworks tailored to local contexts. Externally, global economic and geopolitical factors influence Africa's development landscape, demanding robust international cooperation and tailored solutions. With a continent poised to be the youngest in the world for the next 30 years,² young Africans have a critical role in leveraging the Summit of the Future's global influence to prioritize policy perspectives tailored to Africa's realities that can be quickly implemented to boost the continent's development.

Provisioning youth participation in their resolution for the Summit of the Future³, the United Nations General Assembly recognizes that young people are the driving force behind innovation, progress, and calls to harness young people's energy and passion to create a future that truly reflects their aspirations⁴. The United Nations Office of the Special Adviser on Africa (OSAA) is working with partners, including Member States, Pan-African intergovernmental and civil society organizations, youth advocates and United Nations system entities, to bring *Africa's Youth Voices* to the Summit through an action-oriented initiative that focuses on three engagements:

- 1. A youth-led knowledge production exercise pegged to the Summit's priorities on 9, 16 and 23 September
- 2. A consultative platform mainstreaming young Africans' participation in the Summit of the Future (Date to be determined)
- 3. Public engagements to amplify the Summit's messages to young Africans at the <u>SDG</u> Media Zone during the 76th Session of the UN General Assembly from 23 to 27 September

Young Africans are pivotal in shaping the continent's future, with 60 per cent of Africa's population under 25, making it the world's youngest continent⁵. Young people's active involvement in policymaking is crucial, as they represent a significant portion of Africa's workforce and potential leaders. In a year focused on "educating and skilling Africa for the 21st century," youth engagement in knowledge production is crucial to supporting African countries' investment in skills development. This can propel the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) sector forward, create jobs and position Africa to harness the Fourth Industrial Revolution⁶.

On 9, 16, and 23 September, against this backdrop and as part of a three-pronged youth-focused engagement it organizes, OSAA is working with young African experts, advocates and leaders across the diaspora and on the continent to facilitate a youth-led knowledge production exercise anchored to the five priorities of one of the Summit's key outputs: the Pact of the Future. This knowledge production exercise is organized across four areas pegged to the five chapters of the Pact, namely:

- Global governance and financing for development
- International peace and security
- Science, technology, innovation and digital cooperation
- Youth and future generations

The UN Special Adviser on Africa said, "The time is now for Africa to take control of its economic narrative and for the world to rally its full support behind the continent's work in doing so⁷." The continent stands at a pivotal moment, with enormous opportunities to accelerate its sustainable development and assert itself in its rightful place at the global leadership table. Despite past challenges, the continent's potential is immense. Africa has the resources and capacity to bridge its \$350 billion annual funding gap to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The continent can leverage its vast natural resources, burgeoning middle class, youthful population and innovative financial strategies to drive sustainable growth. By reforming the International Financial Architecture (IFA), enhancing the representation of developing countries, and harnessing the potential of domestic institutional investors, Africa can mobilize the necessary resources to meet its development goals. Addressing illicit financial outflows, estimated at \$500 to \$600 billion annually, further offers a significant opportunity to invest in the continent's future. Through strategic foresight, Africa can transform these opportunities into concrete actions, positioning itself as a leader in global sustainability efforts and ensuring long-term economic resilience.

The continent is also uniquely positioned to lead the transformation of global governance, particularly within the International Financial Architecture (IFA). As the world seeks to address modern challenges, the outdated structures of the IFA—rooted in the post-World War II Bretton Woods framework—must evolve to reflect today's realities. Africa's vision, as outlined in Agenda 2063, offers a roadmap for these necessary reforms. The upcoming Summit of the Future provides a critical platform for advocating for comprehensive changes, including restructuring quotas and voting rights in institutions like the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, and enhancing African representation. By promoting sustainable development-focused financial mechanisms and bolstering African financial markets, the continent can drive a global agenda that prioritizes economic justice and inclusivity. Africa's leadership in reshaping the IFA is essential not just for its own development but for fostering a more equitable and resilient global economy that benefits all nations.

PROPOSAL

Adding the youth perspective to the exchanges enriches the conversation and highlights the urgency of addressing these issues for future generations. Young people in Africa represent a significant portion of the continent's population, and their voices, insights and aspirations are crucial in shaping a sustainable and equitable future. We are engaging them to make the work of reforming the multilateral system more robust and inclusive while ensuring that the vision for a better future incorporates the voices and dreams of the next generation.

Effective Governance

While several African countries experienced improvements in governance over the last decade⁸, there is substantial room to grow. Strategic youth engagement is essential to Africa's development, serving as a critical lever in shaping effective country systems that align with the continent's long-term objectives. By actively participating in political processes, young Africans can drive governance reforms that prioritize their interests, ensuring that resources are strategically allocated to sectors like education, health, and job creation. This proactive involvement not only amplifies youth voices in decision-making but also strengthens Africa's capacity to achieve sustainable and inclusive growth, positioning the continent for global leadership.

Impact of the Debt Challenge

For many African youths, the overwhelming burden of debt on their nations translates to direct consequences in their daily lives. The allocation of resources towards debt servicing, often at the expense of health and education, leaves this demographic facing increased challenges in accessing quality education and healthcare. Youths often engage in discussions around the implications of debt on their futures, expressing concerns that current financial decisions are jeopardizing their potential and quality of life.

The Cost of Quality Education

Education is a key area impacted by debt sustainability issues. With governments often forced to cut budgets, young people feel these impacts firsthand—in larger class sizes, reduced educational resources, and limited opportunities for skill development. Engaging youth in conversations around education funding allows them to advocate for their rights and express their need for investment in their future.

Engaging youth in this transformative process is crucial for ensuring a prosperous and equitable future for Africa.

Economic diversification, moving away from commodity reliance, and investing in human capital are essential for generating sustainable employment and addressing structural inequalities. Strengthening fiscal capacities, improving public services, and expanding social protection programs are foundational for economic stability. Moreover, addressing structural inequalities, particularly among vulnerable groups, and supporting conflict-affected states are critical to achieving sustainable development. Resilience-building initiatives and prevention-focused development projects aligned with the 2030 Agenda and Africa's Agenda 2063 are vital for promoting long-term peace and stability. African nations can forge a path toward sustainable development and lasting peace through coordinated efforts across economic, social, and governance domains.

PROPOSAL

Incorporating a youth perspective into the discussion on international peace and security in Africa is critical, as young people are key stakeholders and pivotal agents of change in promoting stability and development across the continent. Multiple deprivations, including lack of access to basic services, economic opportunities and resources, disproportionally impact young Africans, creating a breeding ground for inequality, social tensions, instability and ultimately conflict⁹. It is important that *Africa's Youth Voices* are heard as the world comes together during the Summit to take concrete steps to respond to these challenges impacting their future.

Job Creation as a Pathway to Stability

Youth unemployment is a pressing issue that directly contributes to social unrest and conflict. Young people often voice their frustration regarding the lack of employment opportunities and decent work, which fuels grievances and disillusionment and often leads to social unrest. By prioritizing job creation within national and regional development strategies, policymakers can address the aspirations of the youth, providing them with the means to contribute positively to their communities. Initiatives such as youth entrepreneurship programs and vocational training can empower young people to create their own opportunities, reducing the likelihood of social unrest and fostering a culture of innovation.

Therefore, policies that promote youth engagement in the digital economy are vital for harnessing their potential as innovators and leaders in their communities.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- This knowledge production exercise provides young Africans on the continent and across the diaspora with an opportunity to contribute actionable recommendations to influence international policymaking impacting Africa's development that are tailored to the realities of the continent, focusing on:
 - Enhanced Global Advocacy for Africa: The knowledge products developed during this exercise will elevate Africa's priorities on the global stage, advocating for policies that reflect the continent's unique challenges and opportunities.
 - Strategic Alignment with Regional Agendas: The outcomes of this exercise aim to influence the alignment of international commitments with African Union strategies, ensuring that global policies are tailored to support Africa's development goals, including Agenda 2063.
 - **Youth-Driven Policy Innovation**: By integrating youth perspectives, the exercise will foster innovative policy approaches with strong youth agencies that address emerging challenges, such as climate resilience and digital inclusion, driving forward-thinking solutions.
 - **Strengthened National Implementation**: The exercise's knowledge products aim to provide African governments with actionable recommendations to support the implementation of global and regional commitments, enhancing the effectiveness of national policies in achieving sustainable development and peace.
- The exercise establishes a platform to bring Africa's Youth Voices to the Summit of the Future, bringing the perspectives of the continent on "Future Generations" and "Our Common Agenda" to the shaping of the Summit's outcomes, including the Pact of the Future document.
- The initiative contributes towards OSAA's wider youth advocacy strategy, intent on creating opportunities for young Africans on the ground and around the world to bring the continental discourse to the New York stage and establish a youth-led, action-oriented policy perspective on Africa for Africa by Africans.
- In line with <u>OSAA's Strategic Agenda</u>, this knowledge production exercise aims to address Africa's sustainable development opportunities and risks by promoting advocacy, providing advisory services, fostering partnerships, and enhancing coordination at all levels while breaking institutional silos.

FORMAT, SCOPE AND DURATION

- During this knowledge production exercise, young Africans collaborating under the umbrella of OSAA's Africa's Youth Voices network will present abstracts of knowledge products related to the issues addressed during the Summit of the Future. They will then leverage these resources to develop several knowledge products to inform African policymaking. Young people will provide perspectives into their research approaches while seeking the audience's contribution.
- This knowledge production exercise will take place across four online exchanges held on 9, 16 and 23 September
- Each engagement will take place for 2 hours from 9 am to 11 am New York local time
- The interactive exchanges will be hosted on the Zoom platform and streamed live on the OSAA YouTube channel, providing an opportunity to integrate live audience engagement via audio and chat
- The exercise will focus on the chapters of the Pact of the Future, namely:
 - Global governance and financing for development
 - International peace and security
 - Science, technology, innovation and digital cooperation
 - Youth and future generation

TARGET AUDIENCE

- The primary target group for this initiative is young Africans aged 24 to 35 who are established on the continent and across the diaspora.
- The secondary target group is the public at all levels, including stakeholders in Africa and worldwide who are engaged in issues impacting the continent's development.

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
